Report of the 1st meeting of the EMG Issue Management Group on Biodiversity

Welcoming remarks by the EMG Secretariat

Following the opening of the meeting by the chair, Mr. Tim Scott, UNDP, Ms. Jannica Pitkanen of the EMG Secretariat made reference to the [Terms of Reference](#) of the Issue Management Group (IMG) (ToR). The ToRs were prepared by the Consultative Process (CP) and endorsed by the EMG Senior Officials in October 2021, allowing the IMG to start its work serving as a mechanism for coordinated follow up on the work of the CP, the UN Common Approach to Biodiversity and the UN Decade on Ecosystem Restoration.

It will be important to connect the work of this IMG to that of the new Consultative Process on a Pollution-Free Planet, that is expected to prepare a common approach to tackling pollution for the UN system. Furthermore, the work of the IMG on Human Rights and the Environment and the follow up of the fully endorsed UN Sustainability Strategy are also relevant processes to this IMG.

While the focal points for this IMG are expected to be the same as those of the CP, the IMG remains open to new EMG members joining.

Adoption of the Agenda

The proposed agenda was adopted.

Update from the CBD Secretariat

Mr. Neil Pratt of the CBD Secretariat informed that the resumed sessions of SBSTTA 24, SBI 3 and WG2020-3 scheduled to be held from 12-28th January 2022 in Geneva have been postponed due to new COVID restrictions, with March being proposed as an alternative time. An EMG side event was planned to be held in the margins of these sessions with the objective to serve as an opportunity to engage with negotiators under the CBD, following the completion of the CP and the Common Approach.

Key documents have already been published, one of which is a reflection note related to the post-2020 GBF from the co-chairs of the Open-Ended Working Group, looking at the progress made during the online session, from which the in-person meeting will pick up. Other documents relate i.a. to the work on the monitoring framework. The Subsidiary Body on Implementation (SBI) will be taking up work that is important to this IMG's agenda, relating to issues beyond the post-2020 GBF such as the strategy for capacity building, technology transfer, knowledge management and a communications strategy.

This IMG is of essential importance to the global biodiversity agenda and the CBD Secretariat. The CBD Secretariat will be joining the work of the IMG's specific working groups.



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Presentation of Working Groups, including draft Workplan 2022

The chair provided an overview of the draft workplan of the IMG and its three proposed working groups. UNDP, UNEP, and UNESCO have volunteered to co-chair the IMG and its working groups supported by the EMG Secretariat, and FAO in working group 3.

It is expected that the IMG meets formally twice a year, and the working groups more often on an ad-hoc basis. The ToRs are valid until September 2022, and possibly beyond pending feedback from the EMG Senior Officials (SOM28).

1. Awareness raising and knowledge sharing (co-chaired by UNESCO and UNDP)

Ms. Meriem Bouamrane, UNESCO, introduced the suggested objective and activities for the working group on awareness raising and knowledge sharing. The first meeting of the working group is proposed for January 2022. Collaboration in the working groups is important, as the UN Common Approach is about joint delivery and achieving an impact together.

Work is envisioned to be centred at both the national and regional levels, using existing tools to raise awareness. Target audiences, available knowledge products and the roles within the working groups are to be discussed. The workflow will be reviewed, identifying knowledge products that align with the Biodiversity Communication Flotilla.

The Common Approach is organised around 15 objectives. We should take this opportunity to work together in a collective way, sharing knowledge and engaging as one UN family to reach the common objectives and implement the Common Approach.

2. Accountability & global-level reporting (chaired by UNEP)

Ms. Corli Pretorius, UNEP, provided an overview of the working group on accountability and global-level reporting. Its task will be to figure out how to have a light but meaningful framework for reporting on UN collective action and on the collaborative work of this IMG, relying heavily on current reporting and data already being collected. This will allow for the generation of a reporting framework that can show this collective effort to the CEB and other mechanisms such as QCPR reporting, some of it quantitative and some qualitative through case studies.

In terms of timeline, information will first be brought together, followed by establishing a framework and working towards an initial report, determining how it would look, and the level of effort required.

3. UN Decade on Ecosystem Restoration (co-chaired by FAO and UNEP)

Ms. Natalia Alekseeva, FAO, provided an update on the UN Decade on Ecosystem Restoration. Led by UNEP and FAO, the Decade was launched on World Environment Day on 5th June 2021, now with over 90 partner organisations, an action plan and task forces looking at best practices, finance, monitoring, science and youth. The Decade is entering its implementation phase and has the support of the Multi-Partner Trust Fund with the first Executive Board meeting to be held on 16th December 2021. There are now calls for nomination of Flagship Initiatives from Member States and partners, with the hope to see practical examples and well framed ideas on how to make restoration work and be more practical in terms of activities.

The proposed output of this working group is to understand how the UN system supports and responds to the Decade, contributing to and coordinating closely with the Coordination Group and Task Forces of the UN Decade. Through the EMG, it will be interesting to see links between different divisions, offices and frameworks and how to coordinate across different activities. Agencies are welcome to become involved in the Decade.



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The workplan includes identifying what is being done in terms of initiatives, projects and knowledge products; raising awareness about the Decade and engaging members in activities; working on coordination through DCO and connecting with RCs on ecosystem restoration and supporting them through the Decade; and finally linking to reporting, targets and indicators related to other activities and working groups.

Other Matters

For organisational simplicity, it was suggested that the UN Decade, which was previously a sub-activity under the working group on awareness raising and knowledge sharing, be a separate working group.

WHO highlighted the importance of including the terms “healthy” and “just” when discussing a green recovery, especially when looking at a Common Approach that brings together different agencies and different areas of activity. Ms. Pretorius explained that the Common Approach was approved and endorsed by HLCP and the CEB in May 2021, however, it will be possible to make these important connections in different ways, for instance through the Annex of the Common Approach and when knowledge products are developed, guidance notes are brought together, or when formulating joint projects.

UNU-FLORES inquired how lessons learned from the past 10 years will be taken into account in the IMG’s work and whether inequality is addressed in the Common Approach. It was reassured that these aspects will be addressed and included across all facets of the Common Approach implementation and in the working groups.

Speaking on behalf of the IMG on Human Rights and Environment, Ms. Gita Parihar emphasized the connection between the two IMGs, including through their workplans. Firstly, the integration of human rights and environmental issues into the development context will include the production of a narrative on the relationship between human rights, the environment and development. A checklist on integrating human rights into the NBSAPs will be prepared. Secondly, a draft strategy for human rights engagement within the CBD is under preparation. Finally, another area of potential cooperation relates to the production of trainings related to the triple planetary crises including biodiversity. Input by members of the IMG on Biodiversity on these outputs will be welcome. Members of the IMG on Human Rights and the Environment are also happy to engage and collaborate with the IMG on Biodiversity relating to human rights aspects.

Closure of the Meeting

Ms. Pitkanen thanked the co-chairs and participants and noted the following key agreements/follow-up actions:

- The three working groups will meet in January (dates to be communicated) and will be led by UNESCO&UNDP, UNEP and FAO with support from EMG Secretariat. Other entities are welcome to express interest in co-leading any of the working groups.
- The entities are invited to express interest in co-organizing or participate in the EMG side event at CBD Resumed sessions of SBSTTA 24, SBI 3 and WG2020-3 (tentatively in March).
